### **MA SJC Decision Narrows Options for Affordable Energy**

**Boston, MA – 8/17/2016-** Today’s decision by the Massachusetts Supreme Judicial Court to prohibit the Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities from approving long-term contracts by electric utilities for natural gas capacity is a setback for efforts to make energy in New England more affordable and reliable. It narrows the options available to reduce energy costs and improve reliability of service. While disappointing, it is not surprising given the deregulation of the electricity generation market nearly twenty years ago.

However, it does not resolve underlying concerns about the region’s ability to cost-effectively meet future needs, which we believe requires an integrated approach using both renewable resources and natural gas generation. We urge policymakers to take a broader, more integrated look at the role of renewables – solar, wind and hydro – and natural gas. A recent report from the National Bureau for Economic Research points out that “renewables and fast-reacting fossil technologies appear highly complementary and ... Should be jointly installed to meet the goals of cutting emissions and ensuring a stable supply.” That integration deserves further consideration.
